### Outcome of the conference participation

Description of the outcome of the conference presentation, including contacts made and potential for future collaborations.

The Dissemination Conference Grant awarded by EuroWeb to take part in the 28th Annual Meeting of the European Association of Archaeologists allowed me to co-organize a dedicated session based on the work of the team of the Digital Atlas of European Textile Heritage which counted with presentations by various members of the Action (Alina Iancu, Catarina Costeira, Agata Ulanowska, Karina Grömer, Maxim Mordovin, among others).

The paper presented during this session, co-authored with Catarina Costeira, offered an overview of current work on mapping the Pre- and Protohistoric textile tools from Southern Portugal as part of the Portuguese contribution to the Digital Atlas. It also introduced the digital databases and digital tools available in Portugal which can be used to support this work. It concluded with a broader theoretical reflection on the challenges of mapping archaeological finds in general, and archaeological textile heritage

in particular, which aimed to feed broader discussions about the development and deployment of said Digital Atlas.

The paper connected very well with the other case studies presented by the session participants, in particular those regarding Spain (Leyre Morgado Roncal), Romania (Alina Iancu & Ania Stan, Georgiana Dinu & Tatiana Iorganda) and Sweden (Karolina Pallin), but also Poland (Agata Ulanowska, Magdalena Majorek) and Austria/ Central Europe (Karina Grömer). This enabled some discussion regarding common themes, such as the need to define the goals and expected audiences of the databases and cartographies to be produced, the challenges of visualization and storytelling, and the potential of digital tools to foster a new understanding and an enhanced visibility for textile research.

I would particularly highlight the importance of the contact established with a colleague (Leyre Morgado Roncal) working in Spain along lines similar to the ones we explored. The EuroWeb Portuguese team has been lacking points of contact in Spain, especially in regard to archaeological topics, and this has hindered the development of joint Iberian actions and initiatives, something we hope to now be able to overcome.

Finally, this meeting in Budapest with several active EuroWeb members has also resulted in new ideas for future events and collaborations, both in the framework of the Digital Atlas and the EuroWeb Anthology. I would highlight the idea to organize a EuroWeb Digital Atlas ‘hackaton’ in Vienna as a first large-scale attempt to feed data into the Digital Atlas and a laboratory for other (in person or digital) ‘hackatons’ aimed at building the Atlas database and ensuring an appropriate covering before its launch.


